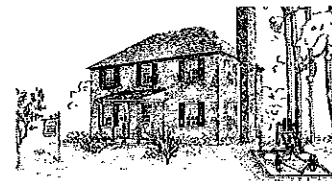
Please support our local Boy Scout Troops who will have holiday wreaths for sale at the Firehouse

## **STREET MAINTENANCE DURING STORMS**

It is very difficult to snow plow with vehicles on the road. The plow is approximately 11 feet wide and visibility is not optimum during a snow storm. Cars are prohibited from extending into the street - they not only block curbside plowing but also create a danger to drivers. Snow from cars and driveways must be put on lawns, **NOT** back into plowed streets. Cars should be off all streets to assure safe and complete snow removal. Catch basins should be cleared to reduce flooding. The cooperation of our residents is required to prevent flooding and icing of melted snow.

## **SIDEWALK CARE**

In the event of snow, sidewalks are to be cleared within 12 hours of snowfall. Sidewalks are to be kept free of snow, ice, leaves, debris, etc.

The following streets are designated **EMERGENCY SNOW STREETS** and require that all vehicles be removed during a snow storm:

**Bayville Avenue, Mountain Avenue, Creek Road, Perry Avenue, Godfrey Avenue, School Street, Ludlam Avenue, West Harbor Drive, Merritt Lane**

## **HYDRANT CARE**

The importance of keeping fire hydrants visible and clear of ice and snow during the winter months cannot be stressed enough. The time it would take firefighters to dig a hydrant out from underneath the frozen snow during an emergency situation could mean the difference between life and death. So, as driveways and walkways are cleared after a significant accumulation, a 2 foot area around the fire hydrant nearest your home should also be shoveled - regardless of whether the apparatus is on your property or your neighbor's.

## **SKATING RINK**

**WEATHER PERMITTING** we hope to have the skating rink available for use again this winter season behind Village Hall. In order for this to be accomplished we must have **at least five**

**consecutive days of below freezing weather.**

Please check our website for future updates. Applications are being accepted for anyone interested in becoming a rink aide at \$10 per hour. You must be certified in CPR and basic First Aid.

- Watch for discolored water stains, unusual odors and abnormal plant growth in nearby areas and streams

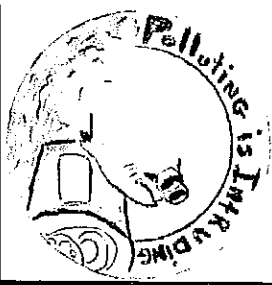

## What's Storm Water?

Storm water comes from the precipitation that flows across the ground or pavement (when it rains or when snow and ice melt).

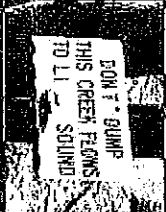


The water seeps into the ground or flows into our storm drains. These are the drains that you see at street corners or flow pours on the sides of your streets.

Storm water runoff is a concern because of the pollutants it may carry as it is conveyed to the nearest body of water, such as a creek or stream, pond, harbor, or the ocean.

## Why is Storm Water Pollution a Problem?

Unlike water that goes into our sanitary sewers, from our showers and toilets, for example, storm water, and all that it's carrying, is not treated before being discharged to our surrounding water bodies.



Storm water pollution can harm fish & other aquatic wildlife, kill native vegetation, destroy aquatic habitats and make recreational areas unsafe and unpleasant.

Nutrients carried by storm water, or released into surface waters when they decay, may also cause undesirable algae and vegetative growth.

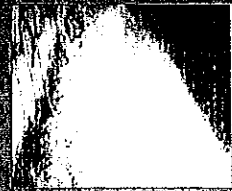
Substances carried by storm water that are considered to be pollutants are:

- Seaweed, trash & debris
- Oil, grease, and toxic chemicals
- Sand and paint products from auto repair and maintenance
- Fertilizers and herbicides from lawns and gardens
- Urines, feces, and nutrients from pet waste and failing septic systems

## Follow these simple steps to help reduce water pollution.

### Landscape and Gardening

- If water flows off your yard onto your driveway or sidewalk, your system is over watering. Periodically inspect and fix leaks and misted or clogged sprinklers.



- Instead, dispose of waste by composting or bagging it and placing it with your household waste for pickup.

Rain is natural, storm water isn't. Up to 70% of the pollution in our streams and waterways is carried there by storm water, and about half of the things we do in our yards and gardens!

### Pet Care

- Push waste down the toilet or dispose of it in the trash. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria to wash into the storm drain and eventually into our local waterways.



### Pool Maintenance

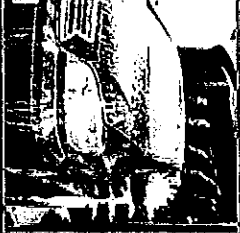
- Pool and spa water must be de-chlorinated and better of excess acid, alkali or color to be allowed in the street gutter or storm drain.



### Household Activities

- Use only biodegradable household cleaning products.

### Automotive



- If you wash your vehicle at home, choose soaps or detergents labeled non-toxic, phosphate free or biodegradable. Vegetable and citrus-based products are typically safest for the environment.

- If possible, wash car or car absorbent surface like your lawn.

- Keep your vehicles well maintained to stop and prevent leaks.

- Recycle these substances at a scrap metal station, a waste oil collection center or used oil recycling center.



- Sweep up debris and dispose of it in the trash.
